







































The prodigal prophet prayed (2:1-9).

Timeless Truth:

Proximity does not prohibit prodigal potential.

Proximity to the God who subdues chaos doesn't prohibit prodigal potential.

Proximity to the God who subdues the greedy grave doesn't prohibit prodigal potential.

God must subdue the heart wherein prodigal potential resides and replace its wasteful ways.

Chuck Swindoll on Applying Jonah: Aligning our desires with God's is always a process. Just because we go through the motions of following God's will does not mean our hearts are aligned with His. God wanted Jonah's actions and his heart. He wants ours as well.
